News from our classes: What has been the most memorable learning this week?

Year 1:

Year 1 have had a great week. We have continued to reinforce class rules and we have been trying really hard. In writing we have been using our imagination to create a re-tell of our story I want my hat back. We have been challenging ourselves to extend our writing and taking care when structuring our sentences. In science we have been learning about seasonal changes and we now understand that different countries experience different weather to us.

Year 2:

Year 2 have been learning about Judaism and why different symbols are important. In writing we have been looking at how to be persuasive letter in the theme of our book the Storm Whale.

Mr Selvin PE:

All classes have been fully engaged in their PE lessons for this week. Years 3 - 6 have been practising different skills for tag rugby, and participating in team games. The pupils from each year group have been fully engaged in their lessons, and there has been excellent participation. EYFS lesson was a game of Ninja Warriors where they had to overcome obstacles while working on their balancing skills and confidence. They fully enjoyed their lesson. Year 1 and 2 have been developing spatial awareness and moving around in space while participating in simple games as they explore playing safely.

Year 3:

We've had the best and most informative trip this week! We have also really enjoyed taking part in Ms M's art lesson around tessellation and the concept of 'identity'. In science, we carried out a scientific experiment where we tested out the force of friction.

Year 4:

Year 4 had a productive week after Ufton court. We have been looking at poetic devices and practising figurative language.

Ufton was also a roaring success, the children were resilient in their approach to their activities and I am very proud of them!

Year 5:

In science, we classified five mystery animals based on their features and characteristics. In writing, we have started our retell of a chapter of Gorilla Dawn by Gill Lewis.

Year 6: In Science, we have been learning about how light travels and how we are able to see it. Did you know that light travels at 186,000 thousand miles per hour? Ask the class what else they have learnt!

Keeping Children Safe:



e to parents and carers

TEACHERS WHO ARE members of the National Education Union (NEU) will be taking national strike action on Wednesday 1st February.

We do not want to strike, but the government many schools face have given us no choice. We are striking for education and we hope you will support us, despite the inconvenience it will cause.

We are taking strike action because we are concerned that cuts to teachers' pay, and lack of funding for schools, are causing a crisis in education.

- The value of teachers and support staff pay has fallen by 20% since 2010.
- This has caused a crisis in recruitment and retention.
- More teachers, and school leaders, than ever are leaving their jobs and

the government cannot recruit enough teachers to replace them.

- Funding for schools has not kept in line with rising costs.
- This means that:
- difficulties finding the teachers they need;
- SEND children are not getting the support they need;
- Schools are spending less on important equipment and resources;
- schools are cutting back on extracurricular clubs and classes.

This cannot go on, for the sake of education the government must change its policy on pay and funding.

We have tried talking to the government - we have provided evidence about this crisis to them year after year, but they have ignored our warnings.

That is why we have reluctantly made the decision to take strike action.

We are calling on the government to increase pay for teachers and support staff, but they must also increase funding for schools.

We are asking parents and carers to:

- support our strike action and our campaign to boost funding for education.
- talk to teachers at your child's school to find out more about our campaign and how you can support us.
- contact your MP and local councillors and tell them that you support NEU members taking strike action.
