News from our classes: What has been the most memorable learning this week?

EYFS:

This week we have started RWI learning new sounds everyday and the children have been amazing at it! Please continue to practise with your child at home a sound a day is posted onto class dojo. We have also started subitising to 3 in maths and reading our story "Rubys worry" we've drawn ruby and her worries and even begun writing our names!

In RE we bought in our 'special things' and discussed why they are special to us. Another fabulous week!

Year 1:

This week in Year 1, the children have enjoyed continuing their learning about old toys from the past, comparing how they are similar and different to the toys we play with today. We have also been exploring different materials and even investigated which material we have the most of in our classroom. Most importantly, we spent time reflecting on how we can make a positive contribution by taking care of God's creation. The children have shown great enthusiasm and have worked extremely hard across all areas of their learning—well done, Year 1!

Year2:

We have had an amazing week in Year 2 this week with so much learning to celebrate! We have been working very hard on writing our own version of our story The River, using our own characters, ideas and descriptive language has given us a chance to write with lots of imagination and confidence.

In Science we explored how solids can be changed using different forces - to demonstrate this we held a toffee pulling competition. The people who created the longest toffee were the winners - congratulations Zion and Marley!

Year 3

We have had a brilliant week filled with incredible work! In maths, we have been using our number bond knowledge to help us solve addition questions to 100. In science, we investigated the strength of four different magnets - ring, bar, horseshoe and wand magnets. We tested each one and compared its effectiveness. In music, our focus has been the keyword 'dynamics'. We practised reading a music sheet to recognise when to sing quietly (piano) or loudly (forte). Well done year 3!

Year 4:

We've had another great week this week! In writing we have produced some fantastic narratives that explore the treacherous setting of a stormy sea. We have then gone on to produce some fantastic narratives of our own without any help! In maths we have been looking at column subtraction with exchanging in the tens and hundreds column. We have been working very carefully to complete these. In science we have been exploring the digestive system. We replicated our stomach by using a bag, we saw how mechanical and chemical digestion would take place! Well done Year 4!

Year 5 Faith:

Year 5 have been working extremely hard this week. Within Maths they learnt about hundredths, using practical resources to represent this and using their knowledge to complete challenges. In writing lessons, they planned for their exploration narrative and began writing their narrative using amazing description and grammar features. Within PHSE, we looked at what all children need in order to learn effectively, year 5 came up with amazing contributions. In humanities, we continued looking at the Benin Kingdom and how people within the Benin Kingdom lived. Year 5 has shown great resilience and determination this week, well done year 5!

Year 5 Hope:

Hope class have taken part in the bikeability programme throughout the week, which they have thoroughly enjoyed! Various groups have been taken out throughout the day where they have been learning to ride/improving their bike riding skills and learning how to ride safely. In writing, the children have been continuing their exploration narratives, which are now finally complete and reflect all of the grammatical and structural features they have been learning about. In maths, we have been using base ten blocks and other practical resources to further develop our understanding of tenths and hundredths.

Year 6:

Year 6 have had a very busy week. In writing, we wrote our diary entries from the perspective of Rose Blanche. We also carried out our class election for positions of responsibility including; eco-monitors, school councillors, wellbeing ambassadors and play captains. Well done to those who won the election! In maths, we deepened our knowledge with place value of numbers up to 10 million. in History, we discovered how women's roles changed during World War 2.



FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS



O WHY ARE CHILDREN BEING OFFERED THE FLU

O WHI can VACCINE? Flu can make children feel very unwell and can Flu can make children feel very unwell and can remetimes lead to serious complications like pneumonia sometimes lead to serious complications like pneumonia or ear infections. Some may even need hospital treatment. It's especially important for children with long-term conditions like asthma or diabetes, as flu can be more dangerous for them.

Q HOW DOES THE FLU VACCINE FOR CHILDREN

The nasal spray contains weakened flu viruses that help your child build protection without causing illness. Because flu strains change each year, the vaccine needs to be given annually. Most children only need one dose.

O IS THE FLU VACCINE SAFE FOR CHILDREN?

Yes, it has a very good safety record and has been used for over 10 years in countries like the US without any major concerns. All vaccines available in United Kingdom must pass strict safety testing before being approved for use. The Medicines and Healthcare Products Regulatory Agency (MHRA) only approve vaccines that have gone through rigorous safety testing imeasures. The regulators continually monitor them all the time.
